Letter from the Co-Coordinator

We have some nice events planned for February, March, and April—a Lenten and Easter trio. First is the Lenten Day of Prayer, hosted again by the group at Christ the King. Incidentally, we are thinking of adding another day of prayer, perhaps in June. If you have thoughts on this, please pass them on.

Next is a special workshop on Lectio Divina, taught by Sr. Maria Tasto. Centering Prayer and Lectio Divina are sometimes seen as complementary parts of a balance in spiritual practice. Sr. Maria is the principal teacher of Lectio for Contemplative Outreach. She brings knowledge, experience, and a sensitive skill at guiding people along the path of this traditional approach to contemplation.

Then, in April, there will be the second Annual Community Building Dinner. Chef Elka Gilmore fixed a wonderful meal for us last year, and will be cooking again this year. Of course, the event was so special because so many of us in this chapter of Contemplative Outreach came, brought family members, and contributed to the warmth of the group. I hope to see you again this year.

In a recent book, *Discovering the Center*, Edward Gray tells of his first meeting with Fr. Keating. Gray was relating his conversion experience, and Keating was looking out the window. Then Thomas said, "Ed, don't be too attached to your conversion experience. If you do, you won't make any progress on the spiritual journey... And remember that the Lord keeps the big bang experiences for the real bad guys." I constantly feel the tug between simple surrender to God's presence and action within--which I can believe in but not perceive--, and having something meaningful to hold to, whether it is the sacred word itself or some felt sense of God's presence. Without surrender I am stuck. Without some consolation, I lose heart. My image of the journey is hiking in the Sierra. Sometimes the trail is flat, sometimes rocky and treacherous. Sometimes one must look ahead, sometimes one must watch one's feet. The only constants are dedication to the journey and discernment. That, perhaps, is how I will see the six-week mini-journey of Lent this year.

Directions to the Ministry Center at Christ the King Church in Pleasant Hill.

The church is at the corner of Gregory Lane and Brandon Road.
On **680 northbound**, take the Contra Costa Blvd. exit. After crossing over the freeway, continue about a third of a mile to a left turn onto Gregory Lane.
On **680 southbound**, take the Gregory Lane exit and continue straight on Gregory Lane.
Once on Gregory Lane, go one mile to a left turn onto Brandon Road. Then after the church take the first driveway to the right. The ministry center will be on your left. There is parking there and also further along the driveway.

Lectio Divina Workshop

Presented by Sr. Maria Tasto,

Lectio Divina is a way of praying with Scripture. It is a means of listening to the word of God in Scripture and a traditional way of cultivating friendship with Christ.

In **Lectio Divina**, one listens to the texts of Scripture as if in conversation with Christ, with Christ suggesting the topics of conversation. A daily encounter with Christ and reflection on his word leads beyond mere acquaintanceship to friendship, trust, and love. Conversation simplifies and gives way to communing, or “resting” in God.

How to “Read” without “Reading”

The moment you started to read this a powerful set of preconditioned dynamics went into operation. You are the “victim” of a lifelong, educationally enhanced learning mode that establishes *you* as the controlling power (reader) who seeks to master a body of information (text). This mode of reading is detrimental to the role of scripture in spiritual formation. In fact, it is but one facet of a whole mode of being that militates against all genuine spiritual formation. This is why the *how* of the role of scripture in spiritual formation is not so much a body of information, a technique, a method, a model, as it is a mode of being in relationship with God that we bring to the scripture.

I would like to suggest an alternative mode of learning, specifically an alternative mode of reading. First, I suggest that your top priority be to listen for God. Seek to allow your attention and focus to be on listening for what God is saying to you. Listen for God to speak to you in and through, around and within, over and behind and out front of everything that you read. You will begin to open yourself to the possibility of God’s setting the agenda for your life through the text.

Second, I suggest that you respond to what you read with your heart and spirit rather than with your rational, cognitive,

intellectual faculties. I am sure that you are in no danger of neglecting those dynamics of your being. The problem is that we are overbalanced in the cognitive direction, and we tend to think that this is proper. However, in Jesus’ list loving God with all of our heart and all of our soul precedes loving God with all of our mind.

A third point I would like to suggest is that you let your response take place down in the deeper levels of your being. Ask yourself questions such as: How do I feel about what is being said? How do I react? What is stirring in the depths of my spirit? How is the spirit of God touching my spirit? Let this exercise be an opportunity to get in touch with the deeper realities of your being. Thomas à Kempis said, “A humble knowledge of ourselves is a surer way to God than is the search for depth of learning.”

This mode of response will also help you begin to open up your “rational filter” by which we filter out so much of God’s voice. You will begin to hear at the heart and soul level. Jesus frequently reminded “those who had ears” to “hear.” I suspect that Jesus was talking about the operation of the rational filter by which the false self protects itself from God.
